Clauses

Main Clause

Makes sense <u>on its own</u> and can make a complete sentence

It was raining.

Subordinate Clause

Does not make sense on its own and gives extra information in a sentence

It was raining when we went out.

Because it was icy, he fell over.

Conjunctions

Link clauses. May also be known as connectives.
