2	Apostrophes

There are two occasions when you should use an apostrophe:		
<ol> <li>in a contraction - when we join two words together e.g. don't;</li> </ol>		
2) to show ownership.		
I'm going for a bike ride.	I'm is short for I am. The apostrophe shows that a letter is missing.	
The boy's bike.	This means the bike belongs to the boy. When there is just one owner (singular noun) we usually add <b>'s</b> to the noun.	
The girls' skateboards.	This means the skateboards belonging to the girls. When there is more than one owner (plural noun) we add ' to the noun if it ends in s.	
The children's skates.	This means the skates belonging to the children. We add <b>'s</b> if there is no <b>s</b> at the end of the plural noun.
