L.O. Write a structured narrative based on the Pixar short, Piper.



Rewatch the video, 'Piper' from yesterday (the link is on the core overview page.)

Imagine that you have been asked to write the narrative (the story) of what happens in the clip. Your audience is a child the same age as you.

Write the story in third person.

Before you start writing, you will need to plan your story.

On the next page, I have done a 'chunk the plot' template for you to use. This is similar to how we plan for writing in class.

Complete the plan BEFORE you start writing.

Chunked Plot	Words, Phrases and notes. Think about WHAT happens and HOW Piper feels.
Piper woke up hungry. Piper had to go to the sea to collect own food.	
A wave came and hit Piper.	
Piper didn't want to try again but a crab guided Piper to the ocean.	
Piper learned how to manage the waves.	
Piper enjoyed foraging for food and ground enough food for everyone.	

Now that you have planned your story, it is time to write it!

As you will be writing about Piper or Piper's parent's feelings, you might want to focus on some -ed opening clauses for your sentences. Some examples below! Have a look at the huge list on the next slide, and pick a few that you could use!

- Petrified by the crashing waves, Piper stayed in her nest.
- Dazed after her traumatic experience, Piper sat shaking, looking out at the ocean.

Examples:

- *Liberated by the lack of assigned homework, George fully enjoyed his Thanksgiving weekend.*
- *Surprised that her kids liked the tuna-raisin casserole, Gertrude added the recipe to her monthly menu.*
- *Devoted to her ailing husband, Martha spent all her free time at the nursing home.*
- *Thrilled that the queen was coming to her house the next day, Doris baked a delicious chocolate cake and made sure all her camera batteries were charged!*
