We're all going to watch the television.

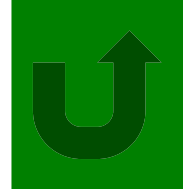


were is a verb

It comes from the verb **be**.

It shows past tense.

I was, you were, they were, we were.

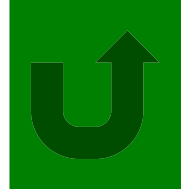


your is a possessive pronoun

especially for children of your age.

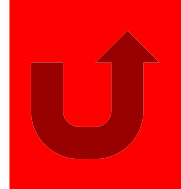
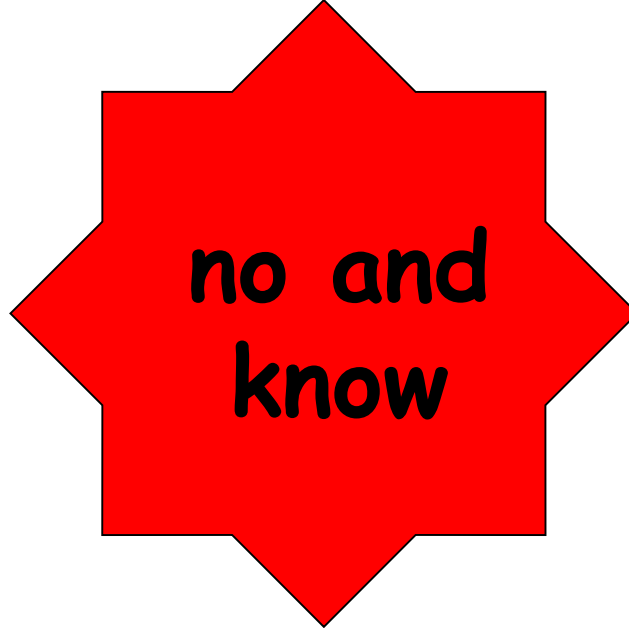


you're is short for you are.

learning these homophones!

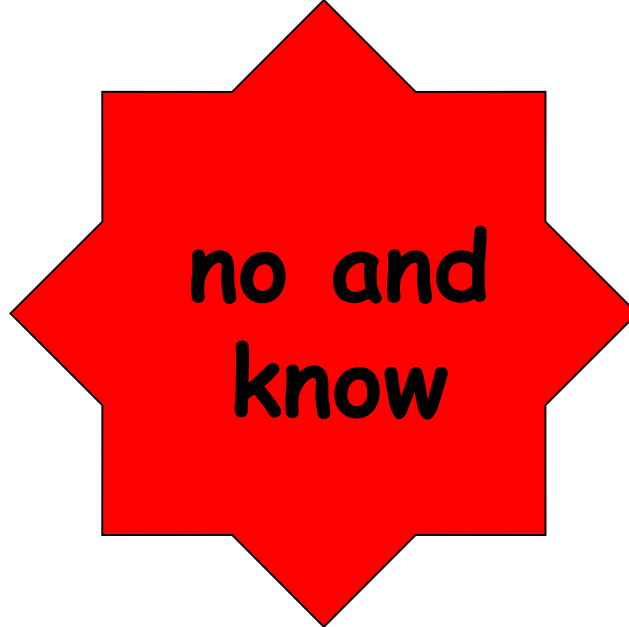
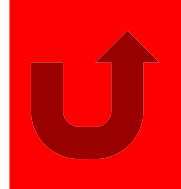


no is a determiner

It is the opposite of old.

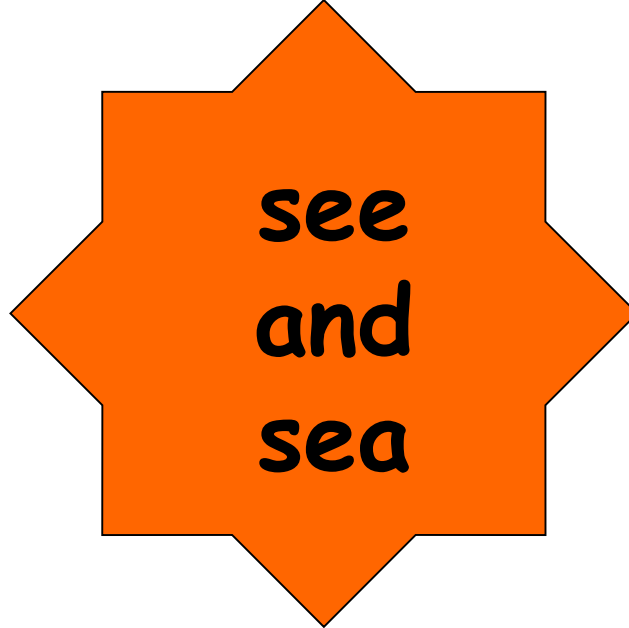
Ali Baba heard the call: New lamps for old!

It is the past tense of know.

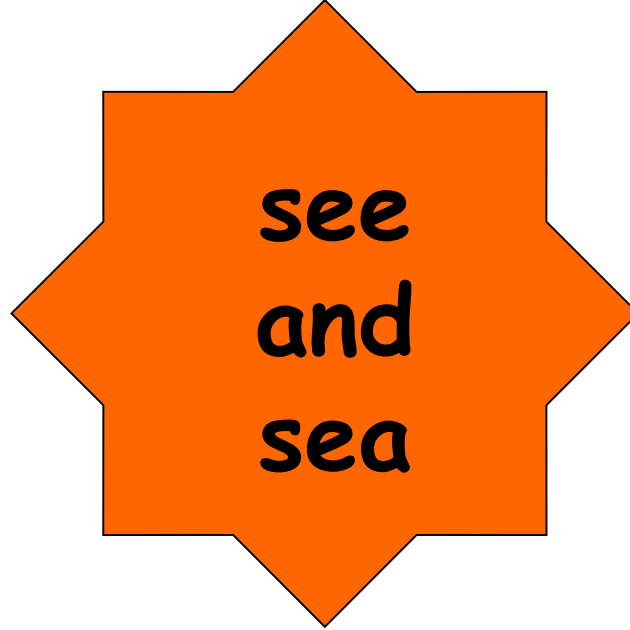
The handsome Prince knew that he must rescue the sleeping princess.

It means to look or watch with your eyes.

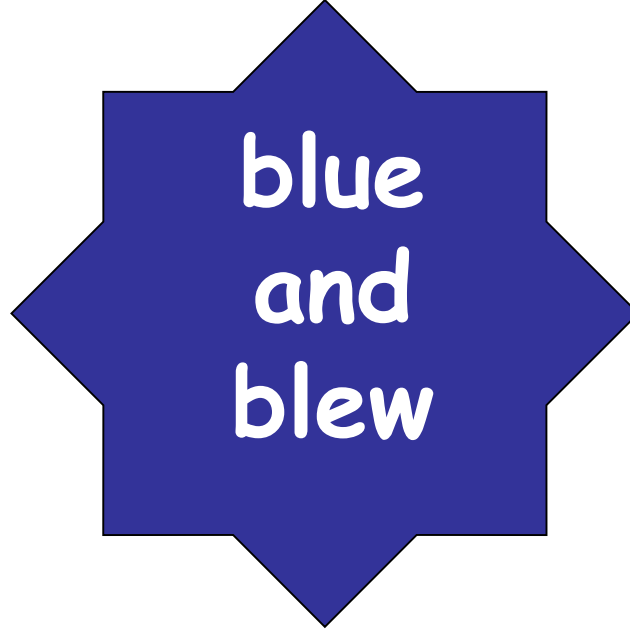
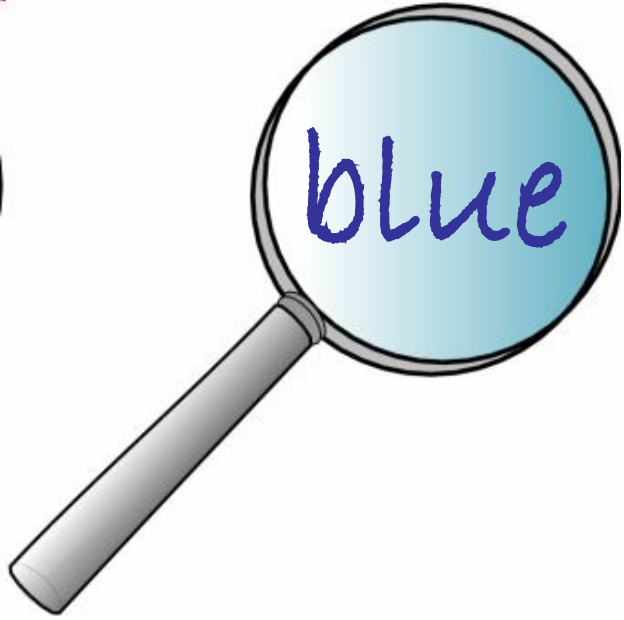
In the distance, Bo Peep could see the sheep

sea is a noun

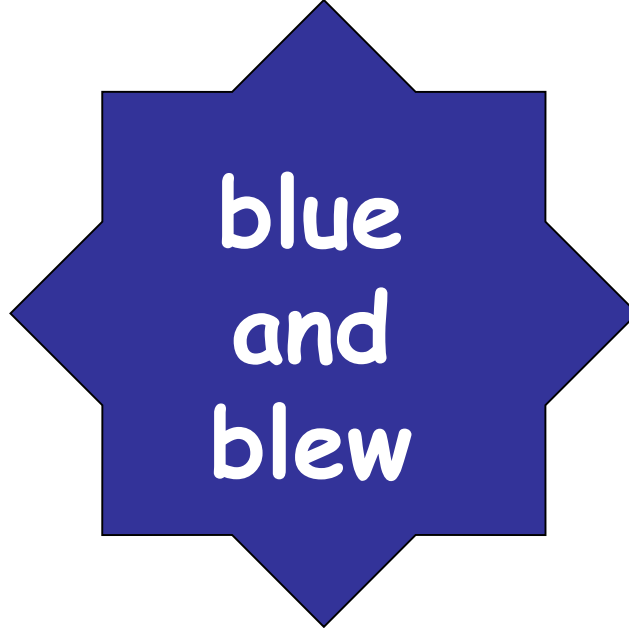
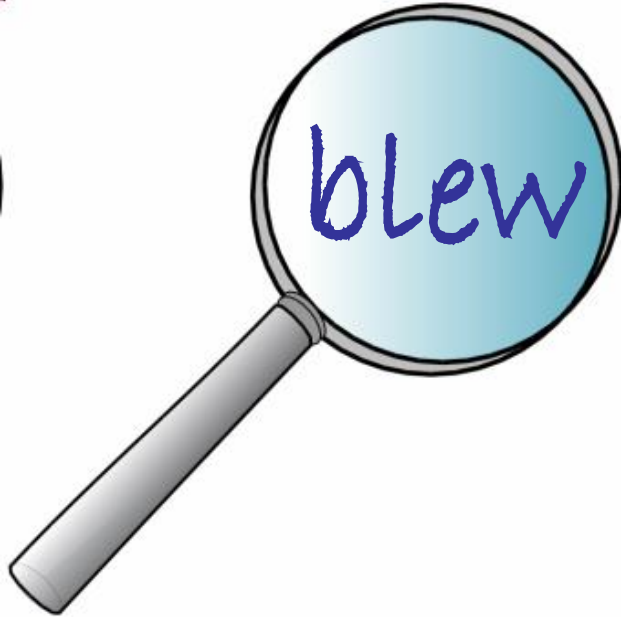
It means an expanse of water.
