TOILET ROLL BEES

FOLLOW THESE FEW STEPS TO MAKE YOUR HOME-MADE BEES

You will need:

A paper toilet roll,

Some yellow, black and white card,

Black pipe cleaners,

Googly eyes and a black pen.

1)start by covering the toilet roll in the yellow card so the roll is not seen,

2)cut the black card in two long strips and wrap it around the yellow card,

3)unowned use the white, cut it into semicircles (half circles),

4)stick the white card on the side on the roll with glue,

5)cut the black pipe cleaners smaller and stick them inside the roll

BROCKHOLES

At Brockholes you can walk through nature on beautiful walks. The grounds are around a large lake where you might spot swans, ducks and herons too. It is a perfect place to go to on your bike for a slightly long ride on part of the Guild Wheel. There is a main route around the lake, some of it is out in the open fields whilst other parts are through there forest, in the forest you might see some wonderful wildlife like deer.

Around the walk you will see a few bird watching houses, where you can go in and quietly watch the birds and other animals on the lake. At the main part of the site there is a café with cooked meals, sandwiches, drinks and ice cream. There is also another ice cream shop near. There is a small gift shop and a educational building there too. All of these buildings are floating on the lake. Brockholes is very known for its floating buildings. For children there is a large playground and hidden in the bushes there is a big obstacle course! Brockholes is another place perfect all year round, but you might sometimes need a coat!

MRS DOWSON'S FARM

This is a great farm to go to for a day out since it provides great food. This includes Mrs. Dowson's amazing ice cream (which is quite widely known) as well as take away tub of it if you really like it! For children of all ages there is a large adventure play area with a sand pit, climbing frame, obstacle course and more. In the actual farm area, you have the option to buy food to feed certain animals like alpacas, goats and sheep. But you can also book sessions like feeding the lambs. At some points in the day, you have the chance to go on a tractor ride out on the fields to explore the wild part of the farm. While you are there you will be able to visit the rabbits and if you want, even hold them! And, if you really enjoyed your day, you could come again since it is great all year round.

BLACKPOOL ZOO

Blackpool is a great place to go in general for a day out by the sea. With its many attractions like the multiple piers and arcades. There are also the many things inside Blackpool Tower itself, like the brilliant view at the top and there is even an arcade, there are more things too that are harder to get into like the ballroom. You can even go for a big trip to the pleasure beach! But Blackpool Zoo is perfect for a family day out. With so many animals, like gorillas, penguins and even chimpanzees! There are also shows, like the sea lion show, where you can watch magnificent sea lions do many impressive tricks as they swim through the crystal water. You can visit the bird house and walk through the enclosure of tropical birds. There is a dinosaur area to walk through and learn about the past creatures of the planet.

Spotlight on...

Edith Rigby

Early Life

Edith Rigby was born on the 18th October 1872. She had 5 siblings and was from a poor class. She went to school at 5 Winkley Square. Later, she moved to a boarding school in Wales until she was 18 years old.

Marriage

Edith married Charles Rigby when she was twenty. The ceremony was held at a Methodist church. They adopted a son later. Many years later, Charles passed leaving Edith single.

Early Adulthood

As she grew up, she noticed women were not allowed to vote. This made her angry and she joined. During a march, Edith was arrested along with other women. As a suffragette, Edith went on many hunger strikes whilst in prison. She was force fed. Later, the police introduced a new rule. The women who went on strike would be sent home to recover and would be taken back to prison. Taking the opportunity, she escaped to Wales.

Later in Life

Rigby was involved in many dangerous situations including setting fires, bombing places and stealing. Once, she set a fire to a home belonging to a famous lord. He was out that night and Edith was arrested.

Many years later, Edith Rigby suffered Parkinson's disease and died on the 23rd July 1950.



DID YOU KNOW?

- . Edith Rigby was the first girl to ride a bike. People didn't agree with it so she was pelted with lots of items like rotten fruits.
- . She was arrested 7 times.
- . Women usually had to stay home but Edith didn't like that.
- . She set up a school for mill girls when they finished from work hours.
