Q: What was your favourite bit?



















Democracy at Sherwood

Every year at Sherwood we have moments of democracy and respect. In fact, just a few weeks ago, people have been voted from years 3-6 as different roles including: Digital Champion, School council, Sports Council, Eco Warrior and Reading Champion. Digital champion is a new role, created in 2024

A very special role, which is highly praised, is House Captain. All year 6s that want the role, make a video outlining why they are the best for the role, and then every other pupil in their house team votes for their 2 desired candidates.

<u>School Council reps</u> make a box for other classmates to put suggestions in, then the School Council will discuss the suggestions in meetings with Mrs Lumb.

How does Fair trade work?

Fair trade is when people who make the things that we buy, are treated fairly and paid properly for their hard work.

Fair trade is essential for people working in poorer, less developed countries.

History

One of the earliest founders of the Fair trade movement was Edna Byler. In 1946, Byler, who was an American businesswoman, visited a women's sewing group run by the Mennonite Central Committee (MCC) in Puerto Rico.

She began selling the group's crafts to friends and neighbours in the United States.

In 1962, her project was adopted by the MCC as the Overseas Needlework and Crafts Project.

Did you know?

When you choose Fairtrade chocolate, you know that farmers in African countries such as Ghana and Ivory Coast are aetting a fairer price for their cocoa.
